From the President

Our most heartfelt thanks to you all for giving so generously towards the last phase of our museum project. The final set of blinds will be installed next week and are very effective in reducing the UV light and heat level.

The refurbishment by QBuild was completed in June and the floor coverings in July. We were very happy to meet with so many of you at the function organised to show you the magnificence of the building. Robert Schwarten apologised for being late and missing some of you. As promised, Alistair Sleeman has supplied the carpet mats for each landing.

The Lakes Creek Cottage displays are now closed. Committee members and other volunteers have been packing up and transferring items to the new building and Gormans have donated their services to move the last of the large items such as the iron lung. We have been having a ton of fun rummaging through all the stuff stored in the RRC igloo at Parkhurst and have transferred four trailer loads already. We work at the museum each Tuesday and Thursday from 10 am-2 pm or later if enough volunteers are present and want to continue. Come and join us if you can.

The MOSIAC training course went well and Debbie and Lorraine are eagerly awaiting the arrival of the new updated version to continue with the data processing.

The Heritage Village Manager has asked that the 40ft storage container be left in its present position and not shifted next to the museum. The committee has agreed to this request.

The committee has decided that the building will be named "Country Hospital Museum" and we plan to have a grand morning opening sometime in November this year. I don't think some of us ever thought we would live to see the day when our vision became a reality.

The AGM will be held in December this year to enable the committee to concentrate on setting up the museum displays. The committee is also examining the management structure of the organisation with a view to streamlining the way we do business for the next phase of our operations. There will be some vacancies on the management committee for next year. Let me know if you are interested.

Museum commended in ABC Regional Museums Award

We entered our museum in the ABC Radio National's Regional Museums Award this year. There were 77 entries. The judges chose a finalist from each state and then one finalist as overall winner which was the North Stradbroke Island Historical Society Museum. They have quite a story to tell because that was the entry to Brisbane for early shipping, and had operations such as the quarantine station which had to deal with such major crises as bubonic plague.

The judges commended five other entries, ours from Queensland, two from New South Wales and one from Western Australia. Since we were beaten by the entry which won the national award, that is a good result. We are still listed on the ABC website along with the State finalists and the other commended entries.

Accompanying our certificate was a letter from Jane Connors, Manager of ABC Radio National which stated, in part: "*You should be justifiably proud of reaching this stage in the Awards which proved more difficult to judge than I imagined. Standards of collections, conservation and community involvement were very high and, in reaching this point, the Country Hospital Museum exhibited the additional, elusive 'something' that elevated you above your competition*".

The “new” museum building

We are pleased to be able to provide another update on developments in the now fully refurbished former Mt Morgan Hospital Nurses’ quarters. This view, courtesy of Dr Lynn Zelmer, shows the overall appearance of the front exterior of the building.



Heritage Village staff-members and volunteers are about to establish gardens and build a front fence. Several foundation stones and plaques from previous hospital buildings in Rockhampton will be placed in the garden area.

This photograph of the front veranda, also courtesy of Dr Lynn Zelmer, provides an excellent view of the welcoming front entrance to the museum. The iron lung will be placed at the far end of the veranda. This was often the practice in hospitals of the time because it kept the noise of the pump away from the ward area. By the way, if you ever wondered whether the iron lung still works, it has been thoroughly checked and rewired and was in operation during our International Nurses’ Day function. This image also gives an impression of the quality refurbishment carried out by QBuild and the impact of the new vinyl floor placed throughout the building.



An interesting and very attractive feature of the entrance to the museum proper is a series of three printed glass panels placed above the central veranda doors. These have been designed, prepared and donated by Dr Tom Dewar. This photograph shows the central panel, incorporating the Association logo, being installed by vol-

unteer Mark Carpenter under Tom’s watchful eyes. The other panels include images representing other health professionals including nurses, midwives, surgeons, and pharmacists.



The major task now underway is establishment of the new displays in preparation for the opening. This is being undertaken by members of the management committee supported by volunteers both from within the Association and from the Heritage Village. Multiple tasks are being undertaken. The office and research area has been set up with the bookshelves and files in place. The cataloguing is continuing.

Here are just four photographs showing some of the volunteers at work. In the first Errol Payne looks on as Nancy Crapp sets up the operating theatre. The photograph shows the theatre light which was installed by QBuild staff.



The second photograph also shows Nancy working on the instrument collection with the aid of Debbie Richards. Debbie and Lorraine Antonello are playing a major role in our work by cataloguing and documenting the collection in the specialist museum software Mosaic.



The third photograph shows the serious business of unpacking and cleaning the book collection which has been in storage for some years. Safety guidelines require that those doing the dusting and cleaning wear masks to protect themselves from the dust and possible 'nasties' such as mould spores. Behind the masks (and smiling!) are Norma West, Yvonne Kelley, Lynnette Wall and Carol McIver.

Celebrating Q150 and the new building

In order to provide Association members with the opportunity to view progress with the development of the newly refurbished building and to simultaneously celebrate Queensland's 150th birthday, the Management Committee invited members to a function on Saturday 27 June. President Yvonne Kelley took the opportunity to update members on the progress being made and the tasks outstanding.

This is a small selection of the photographs taken on the day. The first shows Yvonne Kelley (centre) with Committee member Dr John Learmonth (right) and Mr Alistair Sleeman of Carpet and Tile Court, the company which undertook the task of laying the new vinyl floor coverings throughout the building and which has donated large mats for the entrances.



Here, enjoying morning tea are Jackie Geraghty (left) with committee members Bill and Carol McIver. Carol has agreed to take responsibility for the set up of the four bed ward which will be part of our final display. Bill has been doing a lot of shifting and carrying. He and Gus Antonello have donated the use of their trailers and themselves to move objects across the Village and from the igloos at Parkhurst.

Del also discussed the displays with Rita George. The photograph in the background is Dr Ernst Silberstern. He was a qualified doctor in Austria. However, he was captured by the Nazis in 1939 and sentenced to death. He escaped and came to Australia where he re-qualified as a doctor. He came to Rockhampton in 1948 and became medical officer in charge of Westwood.



One of our key supporters throughout the project has been the member for Rockhampton and Minister for Works, Robert Schwarten. Robert played a pivotal role in gaining the first \$150,000 from the Premier's Department which enabled the Association to bring the building from Mt Morgan and reassemble it at the Village. He has since been responsible for obtaining \$60,000 in Q150 funding which enabled QBuild to undertake the internal refurbishment. Robert visited to see first hand the magnificent work which had been completed by QBuild staff. Here Robert enjoys morning tea with President Yvonne Kelley, committee member Jocelyn Philp and Vice-President Norma West.



One of the rooms in the building has been reserved for a display of pharmacy history and memorabilia. Last, but by no means least, Vice-President Norma West completed the formalities by cutting the Q150 cake.






Watching our website

It is now over a year since the Association launched its website to provide us with the opportunity to tell our story to a much broader worldwide community. Our Web Designer, Dr Alison Payne, has generated a set of data on the performance of the site over the 12 months from 1st August 2008 to 31st July 2009. The data is in the form of reports for each quarter and here is a summary of some of the key points.

Firstly, 1,075 individuals have logged on to our site during the 12 months. With others looking over shoulders, that represents a significant number of people. What is also very interesting is the way in which the number has been increasing, as shown in the bar chart below.



Unless they arrive on the site by accident, most people will look at more than one page. In fact there were 5,157 page views during the period. These also increased as shown in this bar chart:



The ten most popular page views were “People” (684), the “Home Page” (481), “Uniforms” (363), “Stories” (256), “Buildings” (225), “News” (209), “Resources” (196), “About Us” 179, “Contact Us” (144) and “Pharmacy History” (138). The eleven most popular photographs were “Nursing staff having afternoon tea 1900” (80 views), “Nurses in the 1920’s” (62), “Mt Morgan Hospital” (54), “Salvation Army Hospital

1913” (53), “Nursing staff with patients at Westwood 1920’s” (49), “Tannachy Staff 1940’s” (49), “Yeppoon Hospital” (42), “Student Nurses 1950’s” (39), “Rockhampton Hospital Christmas 1930’s” (39) and “Nurse Elsie Crudgington 1918” and “Lakes Creek Cottage” (both 35).

The number of visitors increases when we list our website on sites operated by other organisations. For example, 65 visits came via the Collections Australia Network site and 39 via Museum and Gallery Services Queensland.

Google Images was the referring site for 192 visits while 6 came via email reference. Web searches using search engines such as Google generated 949 “hits” on our website. Searchers typed in a total of 673 different keywords. The most popular (apart from our Association name or variants thereof) included such terms as “Yeppoon Hospital”, “salvation army glenties Rockhampton”, “lady goodwin hospital”, “mount morgan hospital” and “Rockhampton heritage village”. A total of 164 visits to the site came via “direct reference” i.e. “word of mouth” from people passing on the web address.

I believe that these results should encourage us to continue with the development of our website by adding more stories and photographs as quickly as time permits so that we don’t lose momentum in telling our story to the virtually unlimited audience provided by the web. The way in which this website has been set up also enables us to document items such as photographs in the systematic way used by major libraries and state and national photo collections.

The Friendlies

This article about the development of the Friendly Societies' Pharmacies is the third pharmacy article prepared for our Newsletter and website by long-time Rockhampton Pharmacist and now pharmacy historian, Barry Bryant. The Friendly Societies were originally set up to provide mutual assistance for members and their families in times of sickness and distress,

essentially paralleling the attempts of trade unions to gain industrial employment benefits for their worker members.

The early history of Benefit or Affiliated Friendly Societies is shrouded in the mists of time due to loss of documentation. Suffice to remember that lodges flourished of necessity as a consequence of the Industrial Revolution in England in the 1770's. In those times, tradesmen, labourers and ordinary citizens tried to pre-empt hardship, injury and death by contributing a small percentage of their income to a common fund dedicated to the purpose of relief for members and their families. The registration of Friendly Societies in that country was accomplished in 1793.

In the new Colony of New South Wales, it is known that in May 1846 three men met at the Star Inn in George Street, next door to the original David Jones' first shop to form a benefit lodge called "Travellers' Home Branch No. 731". This Certificate number implies that there were 730 previous lodges already in existence in England under the auspices of the original Grand United Independent Order of Odd-Fellows in Leeds, England.

Lodges, in order to care for their members, would arrange healthcare benefits by contracting with various doctors and chemists to provide medical care and medicines for members. As these mutual benefit Lodges spread throughout the new colony, they became an integral means of providing health services to their communities. It was logical that as such Lodges became more organised, they should try to establish their own pharmacies to service members and indeed the first United Friendly Societies Pharmacy opened in Sydney in 1887.

One of the early lodges in Rockhampton was Loyal Pioneer Manchester Unity Independent Order of OddFellows (MUIOOF) which opened on 21st May 1863. Shareholder Lodges include the Independent Order of Rechabites, Protestant Alliance Friendly Societies of Australia, Australian Order of Foresters, Manchester Unity Independent Order of Oddfellows, Australian Natives Association. Individual benefit lodges within these groups were: Loyal Pioneer, Victoria, Fitzroy, Hope of Yeppoon, Jubilee, Queen Alexander, Thistle, Kabra (all MUIOOF); Court Robin Hood, Maid Marion, Lady Norman (Ancient Order of Foresters); Lord Cairns


Lodge (PAFSOA); Never Too Late To Mend Tent, Earl Kitchener Tent (IOR).

Elias Rutherford (see *Alchemy under Capricorn* in this series) provided medicines under contract from his shop in Quay Lane. The first doctor to enter into a contract was Dr A C Robertson FRCS (Lond., 1818-82), who at the time of the Canoona gold rush came from Gladstone where he practised from 1857. He set up a good practice in Rockhampton and was the first surgeon appointed (1859) to the hospital which had been sent prefabricated from Sydney in 1858 at the beginning of the Canoona gold rush. It was then erected on the riverbank in Victoria Parade next to the present-day bridge at Albert Street. After many struggles and tribulations, the hospital site was eventually relocated to the crest of the Range in 1868. Dr Robertson's successor was Dr William Callaghan who will be encountered elsewhere in future articles. He achieved notoriety on one occasion by remarking when asked if the hospital needed improvements that it "...needed none, but the Matron has outlived her usefulness".

Paralleling the experiences in other parts of Australia, during the early 1870's and 80's, efforts were made to improve contractual arrangements and put the Lodges on a better fiscal footing. As a result, a committee was formed showing in the Minutes of Loyal Victoria MUIOOF Lodge for July 25th 1883. Procrastination and resolution of difficulties seemed as prevalent then as in modern times, but the Institute was finally established at a meeting on December 18th 1893 and registered by the State Government on February 5th 1894. The Rockhampton District Associated Friendly Societies Medical Institute thus came into being in order to establish a Dispensary, and provide Sick Pay and Funeral Benefits services for members and their families.

A copy of the 27th Annual Report (1920) makes interesting reading. In those days, the Institute dispensary was situated on the corner of William and Alma Streets opposite St Paul's Cathedral where Green Bros music store now stands. This building had previously been occupied by P A Nelson and Co. as a coachworks (Post Office Directories 1903).

This is an image of the front cover of this report.




The Medical Officers were Dr N C Talbot MB, ChB (Melb.) of East Street and Dr A A Parry FRCS (Eng.) of "Illilawa" Fitzroy Street. During 1920, records show 23,223 visits and consultations carried out and 20,118 prescriptions dispensed. The pharmacist in charge was Mr O M Roggenkamp PhC who succeeded Mr J C Ramsay. Although the prime function of the Institute was the provision of health care and relief to members in times of distress, it was pleasing to note a profit of £260 10s 6d for the year. Other doctors recorded as offering their services apart from those mentioned previously included Drs Bowman, Voss, Stuart, Gordon and Wooster.

In the Rules and Regulations the Dispensers, as they were termed, were strictly enjoined to be "courteous to all persons requiring medicines and serve them in strict rotation"; "They shall give satisfactory security to the extent of £250 if having receipt or charge of money". Prescription books were provided for the use of members in which the medical officers would write their prescriptions.

These are some of requirements in place:

- The dispenser (sic) was instructed not to supply medicine unless the book was produced;
- Members were also reminded that medicine bottles were the property of the Institute and must be returned as soon as possible when empty;
- Members requiring a second doctor for the administration of chloroform would be required to pay £1 1s unless on the said doctor's list at the commencement of the quarter;
- Members had the right of the attendance of any medical officer of the Institute on the payment of six shillings and threepence extra per quarter in advance.

Two examples of scripts from an actual Lodge script book are illustrated below. One is from 1943 and the other from 1950. As well as illustrating book entries, the prescription on the left is notable because two of the ingredients, Solution of Arsenic and Solution of Strychnine, were typical medications of the time.
