As members are aware, the Association is working towards the establishment of an outstanding museum in a building which was formerly the nurses' quarters at the Mt Morgan Hospital. The building, shown above, has now been transported to the Rockhampton Heritage Village with funding support provided by the Queensland State Government. It has been re-stumped and re-roofed and given new steps. The Rockhampton City Council has constructed a new ramp to provide access to the building.

We are still negotiating with the Commonwealth Government to obtain the finance to refurbish the building. The Regional Partnership office in Canberra has objected to the shifting of the building before they had made their final decision. We looked at shifting the building as one project and refurbishing as a separate project, the Government regards it as one project. The Executive committee is looking at alternative options.

Our secretary John Learmonth is not seeking re-election this year. We are looking for a replacement, if you would like to help out please contact me on 4928 5443. Meetings are held on the second Wednesday of each month at the COIN office in East Street 5-6pm.

Celebration of International Nurses' Day

The Association joined with Hillcrest Rockhampton Private Hospital to celebrate International Nurses Day with a function in St Peter's Church at the Rockhampton Heritage Village on the afternoon of 19 May 2007. The ceremony, which was attended by about 60 people, commenced with an Ecumenical Service jointly conducted by Mrs Margaret Perkins, the Rockhampton Hospital Chaplain and The Venerable Dr Rob Philp. Participants were welcomed by Ms Tracey Wust, CEO of the Hillcrest Hospital and joined in a number of hymns and prayers which were appropriate to the celebration of the magnificent service provided by many generations of nurses. Ms Norma West. Vice-President of the Association, led the nurses in the congregation in reaffirming the Nightingale Pledge, the original version of which was prepared by a committee chaired by Lystra Gretter in 1893.

As shown in the photograph, many of the participants dressed in nurses' uniforms typical of the profession's earlier years.



At the conclusion of the formal Service, ACHHA Committee Chair, Mrs Yvonne Kelley, gave a brief overview of the Australian Country Hospital Collection Centre. This was followed by an outstanding afternoon tea provided by Hillcrest Hospital which enabled the participants to enjoy informal time with friends and colleagues.

Association members opened the museum building to allow interested people to view progress following its relocation from the Mt Morgan Hospital and to hear of the Association's plans for the development of the site as an outstanding museum 'dedicated to preserving the health service history of Central Queensland'.

Managing the collection with Mosaic

While the Association has a number of items from its historical collection on display in the Lakes Creek Cottage at the Rockhampton Heritage Village, by far the majority is still in storage. In order to manage and document the overall collection, the Association will use Information Services Technology Pty Ltd's software program Collections Mosaic Plus.

Lorraine Antonello advises that she and Debbie Richards recently attended a two day workshop on the Mosaic Plus program for collections at Intermediate and Advanced levels.

Lorraine writes that Mosaic Plus is designed specifically for historical collections and to comply with the Australian Standard for collections. The program is designed to:

- > Provide visitor access to data;
- > Administer contacts and sources;
- Associate subjects with items and other subjects;
- Perform advanced searching;
- > Select, define and produce reports;
- Export to external files, other applications and the internet;
- Manage advanced data;

> Enable system maintenance.

Lorraine says that "Debbie and I meet every two weeks to enhance our skills in the use of the program. We have entered data on the live system and when the new building is in operation we will both be experts at entering data which will allow the Curator, staff and visitors access to information".

Safeguarding our photographs

Among its collection, the ACHHA has a large number of important historical photographs. As we all know from our own experience, caring for these when everyone would love to pick them up and have a closer look is quite a challenge.

Earlier this year, several members of the Committee attended a workshop on encapsulating photos in Mylar. The session was facilitated by Ms Zoe Scott, the Regional Museums Development Officer.

Mylar is the plastic from which oven bags are made. In the grade used for encapsulating photos, it will not harm the photo and leaves it fully enclosed in a protective film which it is safe to handle. As well as learning the skills, members used the opportunity provided by the workshop to encapsulate some photos from the collection.
